

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

As I write this, Mother's Day 2015 is drawing to a close. On Facebook, friends have been posting tributes to their mothers. Some have shared photos and tender thoughts about their mothers who have died.

I have recently been reliving the birth of my own three children and those early years of parenting as I sort through boxes of memories. I'm moving and so finally had to deal with all of those school papers, awards, first drawings, favorite toys, baby shoes and blankets. Icon Writing: Sacred Windows to the Divine – Christ the Teacher

Ton writing is a meaningful prayer practice as well as technical art form. For this retreat, we will "write" or paint *Christ the Teacher* in a step-by-step gradual process, resulting in a beautifully completed icon varnished and ready to display. All materials and supplies, including gold leaf, are included. We begin each day with meditation and prayer, and information about the history of Byzantine and Russian iconography is shared throughout the retreat.



Phil Zimmerman is a Pennsylvania-based master iconographer who has taught iconography throughout the U.S., Canada and Europe. He has been sharing his talents and gift for teaching with the FSC since 2002. Icons from Phil's studio are painted according to ancient guidelines and techniques, incorporating modern artist materials.








FSC staff members have enjoyed getting to know her since her move here.

How silence comes

God speaks to my heart in holy whispers, too soft to hear until they blow away all inner noise. I eavesdrop on the Dark. I listen for the Light. Silently, God's voice resounds. The emptiness is full.

Is spiritual direction for me?

piritual direction explores God's presence in the ordinary activities of daily life. It can be helpful to anyone seeking spiritual growth, healing or a deeper connection to God and others. It is a time-honored practice of compassionate, non-judgmental listening to another in a safe setting where what is shared is held with reverence and confidentiality.

A trained spiritual director will listen intently, patiently and confidentially as you share your sacred stories. Your spiritual director will journey with you as you navigate through life's complexities and transitions, and be a trusted guide as you discover your inner wisdom. Spiritual directors do not offer counseling, advice or problem solving. Rather, they accompany you as you explore your own spiritual path.

Often, people seek spiritual direction when they are questioning their faith or need different ways to communicate with God, when they lack clarity about their purpose and direction, or during times of crisis or grief. However, anyone who desires meaning and peace at any point in their life may find spiritual direction beneficial.

Many people find spiritual direction to be a helpful complement to pastoral counseling. Most clergy are stretched very thin and are limited in how much time they can give to any single member of their parish or congregation. When you are wrestling with issues of discernment or exploring the deep questions of meaning in your life, you may need to talk to someone for a long time before you feel ready to move on. Spiritual directors are not limited in how many sessions they can offer to a single individual. They will meet with you for as many sessions as it takes for you to tell your story and discern where God is calling you to be in your life.

What is the difference between individual and group spiritual direction?

Group spiritual direction is a similar experience of intentional listening and seeking God's presence, but the process is done within a group. Participants are guided by a trained spiritual director who serves as a facilitator. Some people find individual spiritual direction to be a more intimate experience and appreciate the one-to-one focus. Others enjoy the support, encouragement and collective wisdom found within a group setting. In group spiritual direction, extroverts may appreciate the opportunity to develop their skills of listening to others at a deep, caring level. Introverts may appreciate the opportunity to share their stories in a safe and nurturing environment. Group direction also includes space for silence and reflection.

Spiritual direction groups typically are formed during summer and meet monthly from fall through spring. If you are interested, now is a good time to register as a potential participant. A spiritual director will meet with you, explain the group process and answer any questions you have. Call 608-791-5295 to get started.

The healing power of drums

Drum maker and storyteller Wayne Manthey's voice was quavering and he was clearly upset when he called the Franciscan Spirituality Center this past September to let staff know he and his wife, Laura, had been seriously injured in a car accident and he would not be recovered in time for his scheduled drum making retreat.

Wayne isn't used to canceling commitments. In addition to the physical pain he was experiencing, it was a struggle emotionally for him to focus on taking care of himself instead of others. The Minneapolis couple's car had been struck while traveling through an intersection, resulting in multiple injuries, broken bones and, as Wayne can now joke, his-and-her titanium plates.

But if anyone knows the healing power of drums, it is Wayne. The FSC is so very pleased that he will be back this October 9-10 to present the two-day retreat, *Drum Making and Ceremony*.

When people talk about the healing power of drums, they often think about the rhythmic component of drumming, Wayne says. While there is certainly truth in that, healing also happens in the creative process of bringing to life a drum.

"Anything you can do that gets you into that zone
—the putting your hands to something—will get

you in touch with yourself," he says. The drum's healing properties are found in the elements that make it: the wood, the deer hide, with its markings and scars, antlers and stone.



Wayne started making drums 25 years ago simply because he wanted one. Each drum he encountered wasn't quite what he was seeking, so he taught himself how to make what he wanted. It took a few years before he started leading retreats, and that only happened because a group of "gently persistent" women talked him into teaching them.

From that experience, he learned that he knew more than he had given himself credit for and recognized his ability to share that knowledge. "I saw everyone lighting up when they finished their drums. I thought, 'I've found my tribe. I've found my place,'" Wayne recalled.

Leading workshops had an added bonus: He met Laura when he was hired to demonstrate drum making to her middle school students. "The class got to make drums, and I got to keep the teacher," he laughs.

Being able to return to drum making after the accident has been like returning to a familiar place, Wayne says. He describes drum making as an honor, a meditation and a journey. All are invited to join in the process. During the retreat, he will guide you step by step: selecting the frame, dyeing the rawhide and creating your own personal drum. No special skills are needed, just an openness to the opportunity of coming away with much more than a drum.

Registration Process


